


WELCOME

The two men with whom I have been most closely associated both had a strong local and social conscience.

In the second half of the twentieth century my father, my brother and I gave between us almost 80 years of service to the community.

My father Clyde Fife, was an alderman of the Wagga Wagga Council from 5th March 1949 until his death on 15th January 1971 - 22 years.

My brother Harold was elected in March 1971 to replace my father and served until 14th September 1991 - 20 years.

I first entered Parliament on 14th December 1957 and I retired on 8th February 1993 after 36 years.

HISTORY OF ROOM

For the first eight years I was a member of Parliament, from 1957, members had no office or personal staff allocated to them. The Liberal and Country Party were in Opposition and held the majority of country electorates. Members, for secretarial purposes, were allocated to amanuensis at Parliament House, Sydney, who were responsible for approximately six members of parliament. It was arranged on a bipartisan basis so it would not be unusual for an amanuensis to have three Labor members allocated to her and two Liberal and one Country Party member. In the electorate the Member of Parliament's home was their public office. Soon after the election of the New South Wales Askin/Cutler Government, members of parliament were given an electoral office and one staff member. My first electorate office was in the New South Wales Government building in Johnston Street, Wagga Wagga.

Since that time electorate offices and secretarial staff for members has grown. I always had one electoral office supplied by the Government and because of geography one was supplied at my own expense. In addition, I always maintained a private office in my home and on

retirement this became my only office.

To my knowledge, there would be few offices, besides those of Prime Ministers and Premiers that would have a collection as comprehensive as mine. I have always maintained a detailed collection both in relation to my life as a Member of Parliament as well as the portfolios I held in both the State and Australian Governments. My main collection of manuscripts is now housed in the National Library of Australia under the reference MS 7626, however prior to this, it was kept in my family home office.

When planning to leave the family farm, "Gunday" at Harefield, Marcia and I gave consideration to where my office might be maintained so that future generations could see how an office of a Member of Parliament in 1988 was planned and also to provide access to the material within for research purposes. I first offered it to Charles Sturt University and then to The Wagga Wagga City Council. Both rejected my offer on the basis of the size of the collection and not being able to accommodate it.

When I offered the collection to the Catholic School Office I was asked whether the offer could instead be directed to the Wagga Wagga


Diocese for consideration. Bishop Gerard Hanna and Mr Alan Bowyer, the Director of Schools inspected the office at 'Gundry' and Bishop Hanna agreed to take the entire collection and have it housed in the small parlour at the former Mt Erin convent. Marcia and I were overwhelmed at this generosity.

Geoff Harrison of Harrisons Joinery, Wagga Wagga fitted out my office at Gundry after we shifted there in 1988. He kindly agreed to relocate the fittings to the small parlour at Mt Erin, almost exactly as it was at 'Gundry'. The books and other paperwork have been arranged

accordingly. I have had enormous support from the members of the Advisory Committee in transferring my collection to Mt Erin and in relation to visits by the public.

Arrangements have been made so that when researching at the National Library, Canberra or at Mt Erin Wagga Wagga, researchers will be advised of the existence of the other part of my collection.

PRIME MINISTER MENZIES

At 17 years of age I wrote to R.G. Menzies the then leader of the Federal Opposition. I wanted to pursue my interest in politics and had opted to do so through the Liberal Party. I was seeking a position with the newly formed Federal Secretariat of the Liberal Party.

I was attending Canberra Grammar School and his office had contacted the school to make an appointment for me to see Mr Menzies. When I kept the appointment Mr Menzies said "I have invited you over today because the man who is going to set up the Secretariat is here in Canberra."

At that moment Donald Cleland came into the office. He took me aside and talked about the possibility of doing something to help me.

On the 5th January, 1948, having secured a position with the Secretariat, I took my first steps in carving out a political career for myself.

WAL AND FR FRANK CARROLL

Wal Fife and Father Frank Carroll met for the first time in Rome on 17th October, 1964.

Wal was on his way to attend a Parliamentary Association Conference in Jamaica and called on Bishop Henschke who was in Rome for the Vatican Council II.

The Bishop introduced Wal and Frank who had just finished his doctorate of Cannon Law.

The two then spent the day seeing basilicas and other sites around Rome. Soon after his return to Wagga Wagga, the then Father Carroll was appointed Diocesan Chancellor and Director of Catholic Education in 1965 just prior to Wal Fife's appointment as Assistant Minister for Education.


